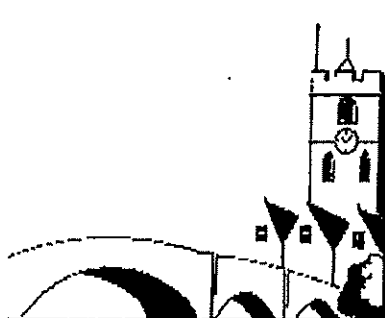

Aims and Purposes

The PCC of St Peter and St Paul has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical; this includes the provision of regular church services, including baptisms, weddings and funerals, and the provision of activities and events to involve and support the wider parish community. It also has maintenance responsibilities for the Church of St Peter and St Paul.

Objectives and Activities

The PCC is committed to providing, to the whole parish community, the means of worshipping, growing in faith, and serving and supporting each other, so that together, we may realise a vision of everyone in the parish coming to flourish, as individuals and as community, through lived experience of the love and grace of God.

To achieve this objective, the activities of the PCC include the provision of church services, baptisms, weddings and funerals, the provision of means of spiritual development and practical and pastoral support to the parish community, and the responsible and efficient care of all resources, volunteers, employees and church buildings.

We have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, and in particular the supplementary guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. We believe that our work contributes public benefit through the development of the spiritual well-being of individuals, the practical outworking of faith in wider society, and the support for those in need. We deliver on our responsibility to maintain and provide the parish church and its services for worship, including baptisms, weddings and funerals, for all in the parish.

Church Electoral Roll

As of 31st December 2025 there were 60 on the electoral roll of which 48% are not resident in the Parish.

Attendance 2024

Figures for 2024 are shown in brackets after the 2025 figures, e.g. 25 (24).

During 2025 the average Sunday attendance on a 'usual' Sunday (i.e. not on major festivals or during peak holiday periods) was 28(43) adults and 4(5) under 16s.

The average attendance at the 8 (23) services held at 8am, was 6 (10) adults.

The average number of Zoom attendees at services held at 10am was 2 (5).

Special services included Easter Day 55 (77) adults and 3 (6) under 16s); Harvest Festival 48 (64) adults and 20 (17) under 16s); Remembrance Sunday 120(67) adults and 35 (6) under 16s); Christmas Nativity Service/Christingle service 52 (51) adults and 18 (22) under 16s); Christmas Eve Midnight in Bethlehem Communion 31 (52) adults and 0 (0) under 16s). These figures do not include Zoom attendees.

Apart from Midnight in Bethlehem Communion, the figures in the paragraph above give the attendance for the main 10am Sunday service only. The total number of people attending worship at services on Easter Day was 58 (83), and the total number attending on Christmas Eve was 52 (149). There was no service on Christmas Day

Outside Sundays and occasional offices (baptisms, weddings and funerals) the total number of people attending special services held for the congregation and local community, in church, was 100(618). The total number of people attending special services held specifically for civic organizations or schools, in church, was 896 (570).

This year, 2025, we reported a worshipping community of 130 (150). This included 14 age 0-17 (24), 82 age 18-69 (61) and 32 age 70+ (65). (The worshipping community is people who attend a church service (not necessarily *in church*) at least once a month.)

8 (36) people (6 adults and 2 under 16s) joined, and 9 (18) (9 adults and 0 under 16s) left the worshipping community during 2025; including, sadly, several long standing members of our community.

This year 6 (10) babies, children and young people, and 0 (0) adults were baptised, 6(7) couples were married in church, 5 (9) funerals were held in church, 6 (4) in a crematorium and 6 (6) burials of ashes were conducted.

PCC's Annual Report on its Proceedings and Activities of the Parish Generally

PCC Review

Up until the retirement of our previous vicar Ruth in April 2025, the PCC continued to adopt a monthly meeting plan with standard 'business' meetings alternating with 'exploratory' meetings to look at selected issues in more depth. The exploratory meetings were used to cover subjects including the financial strategy for the year and volunteering.

There were a number of changes to the makeup of the PCC during the course of 2025. A number of PCC members stood down in April 2025 following the Annual Meeting and Ruth's retirement including Ann Butterworth, Christine Hatfield, Sue Gallico and Anita Keays. We thank them for all their hard work and their contribution.

Aline Ongley retired as church warden but continued as an elected member of the PCC

Very sadly, Anne Beale, a PCC member and our former PCC Secretary passed away in December 2025. We thank her for her tireless commitment and service to our church and she remains greatly missed.

In April 2025, Emma Parren was co-opted to join the PCC by the remaining existing PCC members. It was agreed that Tania Dosoruth and Desmond Nolan would act as Deputy Chairs of the PCC during the interregnum.

Following, Ruth's retirement the PCC decided to reduce the number of PCC meetings to one standard business meeting once every two months during the interregnum. This decision was taken as it was felt by the PCC that the focus during the interregnum should be on maintaining the business-as-usual activity of the church which could be covered during the bi-monthly business meetings without the need for additional exploratory meetings.

PCC members were also keen to ensure that in the absence of an Incumbent, any Churchwardens and a Treasurer that PCC members did not become overwhelmed with too many meetings or commitments that were not strictly necessary.

Since April 2025, the PCC has focused on ensuring that the church continues to meet the worshipping needs of the congregation and maintains the important work that the church undertakes within the community.

Some topics that the PCC has discussed for example have included the continued use of intinction as a means of taking Holy Communion and securing a dispensation to allow for both Lay Readers and Worship Leaders to take services of the word and/or family services without the need for a separate Holy Communion Service.

The PCC has also continued to have a number of discussions around the finances of the church and the need to carry out essential repair work to the church building. The PCC has also worked to ensure that the Vicarage is kept in state of good repair/upkeep during the interregnum and has discussed the continuation of community-based activities such as the Dementia Café.

The PCC also worked in 2025 with Associate Archdeacon Wil North and our Area Dean Danielle Perason Smith and Patron Chris Dench to carry out the various procedural steps that are required to start the process of recruiting a new vicar.

Thanks are due for the volume of work undertaken by the PCC members and also to the many volunteers in the wider congregation and community who have helped the PCC in various ways.

Safeguarding

The PCC is committed to offering good safeguarding practice within our parish.

We have formally adopted the House of Bishop's safeguarding Policy and this does comply with the duty of care for due regard to the House of Bishop's guidance on safeguarding.

As we are in Interregnum, having no Vicar in post, our Safeguarding Committee consists of Sheena Nolan (PSO), Sharon Stigle (Children's Representative) and Aline Ongley (Disclosure Officer) keeping DBS records up to date.

We receive regular updates of policies, information and I attend digital Zoom support training throughout the year from the Diocese Safeguarding Team.

The Safeguarding Committee meet regularly throughout the year and undertake all required training in safeguarding. The committee implements National Diocesan policies and guidance and continue to report to the PCC at every meeting.

We continue to safely recruit both paid and unpaid voluntary workers, all having completed Diocese training requirements.

We continue to hold regular meetings with our volunteers for all groups working within our church and community work; giving updates of policies, any changes to work practices and monitoring concerns shared by teams or managers, and encourage good communication between all workers.

On behalf of the PCC, the Safeguarding team continue to ensure that any concerns or complaints are promptly addressed, following procedures, reporting to the Diocese Safeguarding Advisor without delay.

This includes keeping training records updated, sending reminders to volunteers for training due and also keeping the Safeguarding Hub updated with the relevant information.

The Annual Safeguarding service was held on 23rd November 2025, with a short talk given by Sheena and a video clip encouraging an awareness of the importance of Safeguarding and everyone's role in this, supporting the Safeguarding Team.

A strict "no photography" policy is upheld during all activities attended by children.

All policies and safeguarding information is displayed as required on our highly visual display board in church and the community hub. These are updated when due by the Diocese.

Our staff are made aware of the policies concerning data protection and use of social media (i.e. church notices and our church website).

Worship

This year has seen various changes due to going into interregnum at the end of April. From January to April we carried on with standard Common Worship Order One Holy Communion at 8am and 10am on the first and third Sundays of the month, and Services of the Word held on the second (with Communion) and fourth (Family Service) Sundays. Since April we have had visiting vicars as much as possible so that we could continue to offer communion weekly as the diocese stipulated, offering the Holy communion service on the first and third Sundays. Our Lay reader Peter Smith has led a Service of the Word once a month and our Licensed Lay Minister Emma Parren has led the family service once a month. As lay ministers are unable to offer communion we have tried to find ministers to offer a short communion before or after these services. The congregation has enjoyed and greatly benefitted from a variety of visiting clergy who have been very supportive and helped us to continue to grow spiritually throughout the interregnum. Unfortunately there have been a few occasions where we have had to cancel services due to not being able to find clergy to cover but this has been rare and after a lot of hard work trying to find people, in the end the congregation were signposted to other local churches for those weeks.

We asked the Bishop for permission to change our pattern of worship for the second and fourth Sundays so that we did not have to find clergy to offer communion on these Sundays and in November this was approved. This helped to ease the strain of trying to find visiting clergy which is becoming increasingly difficult. The ministry team have continued to meet monthly to discuss services and have tried to keep the style of worship similar to how it has been and this continues to be appreciated by the congregation.

Des Nolan has also completed a Leading Worship course run by the diocese and has led some services this year. So now we have three lay members of the church who can lead the services which has been very helpful in covering services.

We have continued to Zoom most of the services but the average online congregation has reduced to 2 adults.

Janet Holdstock and Jane Roberts continue to offer services at some of the local care/nursing homes and sheltered housing.

Occasional Offices have continued as required where possible with the Area Dean undertaking many of these.

Pastoral Ministry

Janet takes services and communion to local sheltered homes and people in their own homes with help from Jane Roberts when she is available.

Monthly Janet leads a praise service or Communion at Quenn Elizabeth court, Dennis Cadman House and Appleton Lodge all in the Royal British Legion Village

Janet leads a Bible study group twice monthly

Mission

We have continued to be a place of welcome at the hub every Wednesday and numbers have increased with attendees being from church and the local area. Coffee, pastries and lunch are enjoyed as much as the conversation shared.

Dementia cafe

The steady number of attendees and their carers have enjoyed a very varied programme of activities including crafting, guest speakers and musicians, supported by a team of church and non-church volunteers

Foodbank

We have continued to offer two sessions per week and are lucky to have a loyal group of volunteers from the local community and church.

Donations are gratefully received from individuals, schools, businesses and uniformed groups have been most welcome especially during Harvest and Christmas time.

Grants and financial donations have meant we can keep our shelves stocked and provide much needed food parcels for local families.

Litter Picking

Every other month a group meet and litter-pick around the village, making a noticeable difference to our community.

Reflective Walking group

Led by Emma Parren this has been greatly enjoyed for the spiritual and physical elements, supported by a small group of church members

Families, Children and Young People

At the monthly Family Service (mentioned above) we continue to provide a staffed activity table for the young, in keeping with the theme of the service. It remains very popular. In addition, the children's area in church is used regularly by Sunday and Occasional Office families.

Although the average overall number of under 16s attending church has dropped this year, the family services continue to be well attended, with the youth choir and their families attending.

End of term services were held in church for St Peter's Church of England School. Christingle services were held in church for St Mark's Church of England School.

Under the management of a new group of parents and church representatives, the Aylesford Community Youth Choir continued to move from being the responsibility of the PCC to setting up as a charity in its own right.

Relationships with the uniformed groups were maintained, with a highlight being the uniformed organisations taking part in the remembrance service and parade.

Spiritual Growth

In addition to Sunday services, in 2025 we ran 'Six Steps to Loving your Church' during Lent, which was much appreciated and helped to prepare us for how we need to all work together to keep the church going.

The two Connect (Small) Groups started in 2023 continued to meet and flourish although at the end of the year one of the groups stopped meeting after losing some members and no longer having a venue to meet in.

Also, Janet Holdstock (Pastoral Assistant until Pentecost 2025) continued to lead a weekly Bible Study group.

Spiritual growth continues to be encouraged through a number of opportunities for sharing and discussion, during and after Sunday services.

Health & Safety Activities

Health and Safety considerations are incorporated into the responsibilities of the Fabric Committee.

The Brassey Centre

The annual rental charge paid by the PCC to the Brassey Trust was again waived for 2025. On behalf of the PCC, the church administrator continued to be responsible for Brassey Centre lettings, and for oversight of the maintenance of the main building.

Finance

2025 was difficult and eventful year in many ways. for most of the year we lacked a treasurer and from March we were in an interregnum after the Revd. Ruth Peet, our Vicar, retired.

Purpose of this Report

A Finance Report is a required element of the Report of the Trustees (the PCC) to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. The Financial Statements provided for 2024 comply with all legal formatting requirements. Due to their complexity, this report will focus on summarizing key details and evaluating their implications both presently and in the future.

Headlines

- Total funds increased. The General Fund had nothing in it at the start of the year but by the end of the year had reached £24k.
- A donation of £50k was very welcome, With the kind agreement of the anonymous donor this was allocated £40k to the General Fund and £10k for property repair
- It is important not to allow this donation to conceal a structural deficit, where ongoing expenses surpass regular income. Our Independent Examiner cautioned last year during his review of the 2024 accounts review that **this situation is unsustainable.**

Income

- Our principal income source is "Voluntary Income" (i.e. Giving). This was DRAMATICALLY DOWN on the previous year by £5.7k {12%}.
- There was a welcome improvement on Brassey Centre income and in Interest Received. Rental income for 140 The Avenue was unchanged £13.2k
- Fees for Weddings and Funerals were up on the previous year at £7,5k
- Overall, excluding the big donation, income was significantly reduced.

Expenditure

- Diocesan Offer (aka Parish Share) is a voluntary donation paid by parishes to the Diocese. It is needed to cover the employment costs of parish clergy (including National Insurance, pension, housing, training) with the costs of diocesan staffing and administration. A fair amount for each parish is assessed at diocese level; but it is up to each PCC to decide what they should offer. In 2025 we paid £39,449.
- The costs of operating the Brassey Centre increased this year, but so did the income. As a result, the net cost of the Brassey Centre to the PCC reduced (see note 12),
- Parish Administration costs reduced by 8% which is noteworthy at a time when pay and prices continued to rise.
we incurred costs of £84.90 a reasonable increase on last year of only 1.4%

Our Funds

Unrestricted General Fund: available to the PCC for any purpose. These stood at only £24.1k at the end of last year.

Designated Funds: monies set aside by the PCC for specific purposes or projects but may be released to the General Fund by the PCC at any time. These stood at £424.5k at the end of the year. However, this is £400K as the assessed value of the Avenue which yielded an important rent of £13.2k unchanged this year, The other designated funds amount to £24.5k (Legacy Fund £11,2k, Church Repair Fund £9.7k and £4.6k 140 The Avenue Repair Fund),

Restricted Funds: must be used solely for the purpose for which they were raised or given

At the end of 2025 we £95.2k in restricted Fund. The largest is the Fabric Fund holding £63,7k. For the complete list with details please see the page headed "Statement of Funds" in the Annual Accounts. Note the group of funds relating to a variety of our community projects, largely from grants received for these

purposes. Also note the Sequestration Account: This is a special account set up when there is a vacancy to handle monies received or spent on behalf of the Benefice of the Vicar of Aylesford, for example. fees due to the Vicar for weddings and funerals. The account will be settled when the vacancy is filled

140 The Avenue

The PCC investigated the correct ownership of 140 The Avenue with a view to establishing if there is an equity that could be released to our funds. It was decided, however, especially as we were entering an interregnum, not to proceed any further with this but it is good to note that the ownership of the property has been established as being with the PCC of Aylesford Church

Prospects for 2026

Excluding the generous donation, our routine expenditure surpassed routine income by £14.3 during the year. If current conditions were to persist in 2026, we would have a monthly deficit of £1.3k which is not tolerable.

Costs seem to have been well controlled during 2025. There are always cost savings to be found in any organisation but the prospects for 2026 look more difficult with inflation rising. **Increasing income must be the priority.**

Giving, especially planned giving, is the bedrock of most parish church's finances. A positive straw in the wind for us is that planned giving had risen in December 2025 to a level equivalent to £33.7k a year or £3.4k better than 2025.

The housing market is very uncertain at the moment The rent on 140 The Avenue (unchanged during 2025), will need to be kept under close review. there may be an opportunity to increase it but there are complications and risks to evaluate.

Reserves Policy 2023

In addition to money designated for specific purposes including investments, it is the policy of the PCC to maintain (if possible) a balance of Liquid Unrestricted Funds which equates to four months Unrestricted Expenses, to be available to cover emergency situations that may arise from time to time. For 2025, four months Unrestricted Expenses amounted to circa £28,300. Our Actual balance of Liquid Unrestricted Funds amounts to £24,085. This is a little under that required by our policy and highlights the concerns with the depletion of our reserves.

Annual Report of Fabric, Goods and Ornaments

Since April 2025 the Church has been in Interregnum and so decisions with regard to any repairs and refurbishment, have been decided in conjunction with the PCC, Fabric Committee and Rochester DACS

With regard to outstanding issues highlighted in the Quinquennial Report (2023) several areas with regard to church maintenance and repair continued to remain on hold

However. in Autumn 2025 a builder Mr Lees Pendergast of All Church Maidstone based in Bromley. gave us a quote to address most of the recommendations within the report, and this also included a complete repaint of the inside of the church using Lime Wash paint as directed by Rochester Diocese DACS Committee.

The proposed works were unanimously approved by the members of Aylesford PCC.

It was suggested that refurbishment of the Church commence in early spring 2026 during a quieter period for the Liturgical Church Year i.e. following Easter 26. Permission would also need to be obtained in form the Bishop of Rochester to close the church during the duration of the works and permission also to move church services to the Church Brassey Centre. It might be worth noting that permission was given for both of these alterations once dates were known early this year (26).

The main areas highlighted by the Quinquennial report and which are scheduled for repair include:

Repair of Plasterwork in the Sanctuary

Repointing of the outside wall of the Sanctuary using Lime based materials

Repair of hole in ceiling fabric above the main Altar in the Sanctuary

To rod accessible gullies

Repair areas of damaged plasterwork, particularly above an arch in the Nave opposite the door to the Vestry

A complete repaint of the inside fabric of the church would also be carried out using Lime wash paint. It was also recommended and approved that the Church radiators would also be included in the refurbishment

The Church Organ would also need to be covered during the duration of Church closure and refurbishment

Repairs : 2025

Repair to storm damaged guttering - West side of Vestry (January 2025)

Replacement of Church Tower Iron down pipe (November 2025)

Inspections

All Statuary checks were carried out as due i.e., GAS Safety check and an Annual Inspection of Fire Equipment County Fire Protection (September 2025)

Fire notices were also renewed in the Church and Tower and Brassey Centre

Church car park

The demand for parking in the small church car park continued in 2025 from school teachers and others visiting the church. However, the car park was beginning to show signs of wear and as a result a few potholes have developed which will need attention in the New Year

The issue of parking generally it was felt was ripe for discussion with regard the numbers wishing to use the car park. and also, with regard to the number of people (mainly teaching staff of the nearby school)

parking in the vicarage drive, thereby restricting access to the vicarage. It was decided to seek to clarify the situation with the Diocese at the earliest opportunity with a view to a way forward

Memorial

In memory of Andy Brown a long-time parishioner of the church, and at the request of his relatives, a Rowan Tree and small plaque was added to the churchyard near to the war memorial, when permission was granted by Rochester Diocese DAC Committee

Church AV System

With regards to the acquisition of a new AV System for the church, the PCC decided to put this on hold until a new Incumbent was appointed

Fabric Committee

The Fabric Committee welcomed three new members to its numbers: Kevin Kings, James Lloyd and Des Nolan. who will prove to be an asset to the team

Deanery Synod 2025

The Deanery Synod provides for parishes to channel their views to the Diocesan Synod and implements decisions made by the General Synod. During 2025 our representatives were Revd Ruth Peet (until April 2025), Tania Dosoruth and Desmond Nolan. Danielle Pearson-Smith remains in post as our Area Dean.

Deanery Synod meetings took place on 4 February 2025, 13 May 2025 and 6 October 2025 at Mereworth, Snodland and Larkfield respectively.

The meetings this year were focused on the new Vision and Strategy of the Diocese of Rochester, with presentations by Matthew Girt, the Diocesan Secretary and Bishop Jonathan on 13 May 2025 on this topic. The key objectives of the Diocese's vision are to grow missional churches, with missional leaders and missional disciples, that are creating a safe and healthy culture for all; growing younger and more diverse; growing spiritually and numerically; impacting their communities; releasing financial resources for mission and planting and growing new missional churches.

Other topics that were covered included environmental issues and Eco Church works and Safeguarding. There has also been a number of discussions regarding vacancies and re-organisation and the financial pressures facing a number of churches in the Deanery.

The meetings for 2026 are due to take place 9 February 2026 (TBC), 16 June 2026 (Leybourne) and 7 October 2026 (Barming).

Independent Examiner's report to the Member/Trustees of St Peter and St Paul Aylesford

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2025 which are set out on the pages following.

Respective responsibilities of the Trustees and Independent Examiner

The church's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The church's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to

- Examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- Follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- State whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiner's Statement

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Independent Examiner's statement

In connection with my examination, no matter has come to my attention:

- (1) which gives me reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect the requirements
 - to keep accounting records in accordance with section 130 of the 2011 Act; or
 - to prepare accounts which accord with these accounting records have not been met; or

Bellringers and Steeple Keepers Report

During the course of 2025 and into 2026 I am teaching two schoolgirls to ring as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award. They attended the volunteers day at the end of 2025 and obtained approval from their school to learn to ring.

Sadly ringing for Sunday services is now only 3 or 4 at best. Though most times it is as low as 1. Nevertheless, we continue to call the faithful to church.

We have continued to run successful weekly practices, helped by a number of visiting ringers regularly attending.

On 27th April 2025 we rang a quarter peal to mark Ruth Peet's farewell following her last service at the church. We also rang on 8th May 2025 in commemoration of the 80th anniversary of VE Day. Eight other quarter peals and one full peal were rung during the year. Most recently I was able to assemble a band at very short notice to ring on Friday 20th March 2026 to mark the pilgrimage of The Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally, Archbishop of Canterbury, as she walked through Aylesford village.

We have also rung for a number of weddings and funerals throughout the year. Again, we have had to rely on help from others to fulfil these commitments, especially the funerals, and increasingly weddings, which are during the working week and some of our existing band are working or at school.

Paul Bastow, our Steeple Keeper, continues to undertake periodic inspections of the fabric of the bells and tower, including the roof. He also ensures the flag is flown from the tower roof on appropriate occasions.

The winding of the church clock is now undertaken by an electric winding mechanism designed and built by Mark Elvers, who is the Tower Captain and steeple keeper at St Michael and All Angels in Maidstone. This required no alteration or modifications to the clock. Thereby obviating the need for a faculty. The cost has been borne by me.

Finally, I am pleased to say I have returned to ringing following suffering a stroke and pneumonia in 2024. I am most grateful for the help and support I receive from all our visiting ringers, especially those from St James the Great in East Malling, without whom it would not be possible to run the weekly practices.
